History of the Saw

More than half a million years ago, man took a tremendous step. That step helped to distinguish him forever from the less intell igent and un-selfconscious animal world: hebegan to make hand tools. Because they were of such great antiquity, many of our familiar hand tools had already attained a late stage of development in classical or medieval times.

The very thing that surprises people today when they first see four or five hundred years-old axes, planes, hammers, chisels and saws is that they all look so 'modern'.

The basic principle of sawing was first devised in the pre-metal age. Neolithic man adapted as tools the objects he found around him; he cut crude and uneven notches or serrations in the edges of flint flakes.

The principle of abrasion man understood from his fire-saw or sawing-thong. This was a system of rubbing one piece of wood, bamboo or thong (saw) against another (hearth) so that the sparks from the friction fell into the sawing dust and made fire. It was a technique common all over Europe, India, Australia, South-East Asia and the Pacific Islands.

Archaeological excavations in Southern France have provided some very early examples of flint saws from what pre-historians call the Magdalenian culture of the Upper Palaeolithic period (reindeer period).

Many such saws were still being used countless years later in the so-called Bronze age, and were being copied in metal. Saws six or seven thousand years old made from a black v itreous lava called obsidian were uncovered in the great excavations at the ancient Sumerian capital, Ur of the Chaldees in MesopotaPrehistoric, ancient and medieval times (to about 1450) mia.

These small, two inch-long blades (now in the University of Pennsylvania Museum at Philadephia in the United States) were the tools of Sumerian craftsmen in the legendary lands of the Garden of Eden between the rivers Tigris and Euphrates, two thousand years before the birth of Abraham.

Prehistoric saws which were found in the tumuli or burial mounds of Northern England, in French caves, in the stone-heaps or Kjokken-Moddings of Sweden and Denmark and in former lake-dwelling sites in Switzerland and Italy have an average length of about three inches and vary in length from one and a half inches to nine inches.

Many flint artefacts were not true saws but sickles, and these very tiny saws were used to cut bone, wood and horn in the making of ornaments. Flint was favoured, being hard and chipping into a keen, straight cutting-edge. It is even thought that the best kinds of flint for this purpose were used in prehistoric trade. But the flint saw was thick and easily wedged in the cutting groove.

The problem was not solved at this stage of history, despite the more sophisticated models like those found at Palada, Northern Italy, and Vinelz, Switzerland, on which serrated flintflakes are mounted with natural asphalt in a grooved wooden or stag horn handle.

The length and shape of pre-metal saws were determined largely by accident. Man merely adapted what he found at hand and had little choice of design.

Pacific islanders used sharks' teeth saws, the aborigines of Madeira favoured the, snout of the saw-fish, while the Caribbean Indians notched shells and the Aztecs (like the Sumerians long before) used obsidian, found in quantities on the volcanic slopes of Mexico.

They all had to accept the dictates of local geography. With the coming of metals man could himself design and determine the kind of saw he wanted.

Historical Summary of the Disston Saw Works



HENRY DISSION

1819 - Henry Disston is born in Tewksbury, England.

1833 - Henry Disston arrives in Philadelphia with his father and sister. His father three days later. Henry goes to work for the sawmaking firm of Lindley, Johnson and Whitecraft.

1840 - The above firm goes out of business and H. Disston founds his own firm at 21 Bread St. in downtown Philadelphia.

1846 - After several moves he locates at the corner of Front and Maiden (later named Laurel) Streets.

1855 - Disston builds his own furnace and probably casts the first crucible steel in America. Because of prejudice against American made steel, Disston conceals the fact that he is not using the imported product. Disston issues his first catalog and his product line is expanded to include knives, trowels, squares, levels, gauges. and "springs made to order.'

1861 - Disston offers his facilities to the Federal Government for the war effort, and begins the manufacture of scabbards, swords, guns, knapsack mountings, etc., in addition to saws, keeping the plant in operation day and night.

1864 - Production is up to \$35,000 a month. Most of the factory goes up in flames. Ten days after the fire the works are in full scale operation, set up temporarily under a sailcloth canopy.

1865 - Production is now \$70,000 per month. Disston introduces the bandsaw for his handle manufacture. This increases production from 20 dozen to 165 dozen handles per day. He begins the manufacture of files.

1869 - Saws up to this date are marked "Henry Disston" stamped not etched, on the blade in an arched form., measuring 25mm., the largest dimension.

1870 - Henry Disston's oldest son, Hamilton who served in the Union Army, joins the firm. The firm becomes Henry Disston & Son, and this mark is etched on the blade.

1871 Henry Disston's second son, Albert H. Disston is taken into the firm and the name becomes Henry Disston & Sons. Later the three remaining sons will join the firm. They are Horace C., William, and Jacob S. He purchases land and a sawmill at Tacony, in the northern part of Philadelphia and moves most operations there.

1874 - Henry Disston designs and introduces the first skewback saw.

1876 - Disston products receive the highest honors at the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia.

1877 - Disston develops the machinery and commences manufacturing mechanically-cut files.

1878 - Henry Disston dies on March 16, in his 59th year.

1886 - The business is incorporated.

1889 - Disston produces the first 18" circular metal cutting saw in America.

1894 - Disston makes the first power hacksaw blades in the U.S.

1906 - Disston casts the first heat of electric saw steel of crucible quality in the U.S.

1917 - The Disston Handbook for this year states: "The 'Nib' near the end of a hand saw has no practical use whatever. It merely serves to break the straight lines of the back of the blade and is an ornamentation only!"

1924 - Disston makes 110" diameter Spiral Inserted Tooth cut-off saws for cutting shingle bolts from the large logs on the Pacific coast. Each weighs 675 pounds, each has 190 teeth.

1955 - H.K. Porter Co. Inc. of Pittsburgh purchases the Disston Saw Works. The saws manufactured are etched with both the name Henry Disston and H.K. Porter Co. Inc.

1970 - Disston saws are being manufactured by the H. K. Porter Co. at a factory in Danville, Virginia.

1975 - The company is sold to Sandvik the Swedish saw firm.







This 700 page book is the first major reference work on the subject, giving tool collectors and historians what is probably the largest source of names in tool making and retailing. In form it was inspired by the 3rd edition of British Planemakers, and the 500 page directory is similar in layout, giving locational and biographical information on over 1000 makers and dealers.

Most of the 2000-plus illustrations are of saws from the author's collection, supplemented from the riches of the Ken Hawley Collection in Sheffield, where much of the research was done, and by unusual marks sent by friends world wide.

There are fully illustrated chapters on how saws were made, on the main centres of manufacture, and how the changing appearance and design of saws, handles and decorative medallion screws enable a saw to be dated.

A chapter on types of saw amplifies the entries in Salaman's Dictionary.
